1. CHILD'S SEXUAL DEVELOPMENT IS DIFFERENT THAN SAME AGE PEERS.

- A. Engages in sexual behaviors with children who are quite a bit older or younger.
- E. Seems different than same-age children when it comes to sex.
- U6. Has an understanding of sex greater than would be expected for his/her age.

2. CHILD SHOWS ANXIETY GUILT AND/OR SHAME ABOUT SEX.

- N. Child feels fear or anxiety in relation to sexuality or sexual behaviors.
- O. Child feels guilt or shame in relation to sexuality or sexual behaviors.

3. CHILD HAS A GREATER THAN EXPECTED EMPHASIS ON SEX AND SEXUALITY.

- C. The child's sexual behaviors are a large, rather than a small part, of his or her life and daily activity.
- F. Engages in more sexual behaviors than other same-age children.
- U7. Seems overly interested in sex.

4. CHILD DOES NOT RESPOND TO LIMIT SETTING.

- G. Engages in sexual behaviors in spite of consistent and clear requests by adults to stop.
- H. Engages in sexual behaviors with child/ren despite the child/ren saying "no."
- I. Child appears to be unable to stop self from engaging in sexual behaviors.
- J. Child engages in sexual behaviors in public after being told not to do so.
- K. Other children complain about the child's sexual behavior or talk.

5. CHILD IS CONFUSED REGARDING SEXUAL BOUNDARIES.

- B. Engages in sexual behaviors with child/ren with whom he/she does not regularly play.
- L. Child's sexual behaviors are directed at adults who feel uncomfortable receiving them.
- M. Child (four years of age and older) does not understand his/her rights or the rights of others about sexual behaviors.
- R. Child sexualizes nonsexual things, interactions with others, or relationships.

6. CHILD SHOWS ADULT-LIKE SEXUAL BEHAVIORS.

- D. Child acts more like an adult than a child in relation to sex.
- Q. Child engages in extensive, persistent, mutually agreed upon adult-type sexual behaviors with child/ren.
- Y. Child engages in sexual behaviors that are becoming more frequent, more concerning and more intrusive over time.

7. CHILD DISREGARDS OR OBJECTIFIES OTHERS.

- T. Child uses "distorted" logic to justify sexual behaviors ("She didn't say 'no.'" "He didn't run away.")
- Z. Child shows a lack of empathy or caring toward the other child/ren involved in the sexual behavior.

8. CHILD HAS ANGRY FEELINGS ABOUT SEX.

- P. Child feels anger in relation to sexuality or sexual behaviors.
- U. Child uses bad language and/or acts angry before, during or after sexual behaviors.

9. CHILD USES COERCION OR HURTS OTHERS WITH SEX.

- S. Child engages in sexual behaviors that cause physical or emotional pain or discomfort to self or others.
- V. Child uses physical force before, during or after sexual behaviors.
- W. Child uses sex to hurt someone else.
- X. Child uses bribes, manipulation, threats, force or other coercive means to get another child to engage in sexual behaviors.
